

We are hoping to be back to a more normal operating schedule in the first part of 2022. We are waiting to see what the covid virus does through the holiday season. We also need our Ser-Job workers back with us. The government has had them off because of the covid viruses. They are the workers that do the clean-up in the building. Which is a job that the four of us that usually run things would find difficult if not impossible to keep up with by ourselves.

The Center is so grateful for all of you and the support you have given us all year long. We cannot do the ministry without your prayers, donations and support. I cannot do the ministry without the dedicated volunteers and of course God's blessings.

We have faith that God will continue to watch over us and help as many people as we can in 2022.
